### Hello Members of the Assembly,

We are excited to present our report on the results of the First Year Council Election. As per Bylaw 10 - Elections 2.1.5, the elections department is required to relay to the SRA the results of each electoral period, including recommendations of the Elections Committee.

We are pleased to say that the FYC elections ran successfully without any major issues that we couldn't handle. We did have to extend nominations for certain seats but they all successfully got filled in the end and we are happy to now have successfully elected a full First Year Council. We were pleased with the voter turnout, which was around 16% for the executive positions and varied throughout the residence buildings with nothing less than 10%. This is an increase from the previous year. We hope to carry on this trend of increased turnout with our future elections this year and the elections in the years to come.



# **Promotional Events & Strategies**

### **Nominations Promotion**

We ordered a Digital + Print package to promote the election online, primarily through our social media, Facebook, X, and Instagram. We had physical posters posted throughout campus as well as a MUSC banner and a Mills Plaza window banner. The package included important information such as the seats available and all key dates for the election such as the nomination period and polling/votes of confidence dates. Aside from this package, we utilized the EDL to email students' reminders of upcoming deadlines and to encourage them to stand for election. We shared many social media stories (primarily through Instagram) to engage with students. Lastly, we also utilized the campus media screens and the large MUSC screen to ensure maximal exposure to the student body.

The department hosted several events to engage with students and educate them about FYC and the upcoming election. Our first events were Faculty Fest and ClubsFest where we had a table set up and spoke to students regarding the Elections Department and the elections we hold throughout the year, with particular focus on FYC. We also hosted, in collaboration with FYC, the FYC Meet and Greet where we saw a very high level of engagement: we interacted with almost 80 first year students and distributed 42 nomination forms. The students got the opportunity to meet with the CRO, DRO, FYC Coordinator as well as some BoD members. Our last event was the Elections 1A03 event which gave students the opportunity to learn more about the elections process as well as other ways to become involved in the MSU. Snacks and beverages were provided at the event. We booked Campus Connect for multiple days in efforts to connect with students and provide information about the elections process and to educate them about FYC.

Due to the unfilled seats, we re-released our promotional package with the primary and secondary extension information. We utilized the EDL to email students belonging to the constituencies of open seats, reminding them of the extension dates and encouraging them to run.

Overall, we are satisfied with the promotional strategy that we employed and are content with the awareness and interest generated in the MSU FYC election.
